How 4-H shaped a lifetime of service for Bea Bagby



For **Beatrice H. Bagby**, known to most as Bea, 4-H wasn't just a club. It was a lifeline. A spark. A community. And ultimately, a calling.

And in the midst of rebuilding a new family rhythm, she found something unexpected: 4-H.

"At some point in 1947, I found 4-H — though I don't remember how," Bea said.

It was the beginning of a seven-year 4-H journey in Mrs. Paul Hentges' 4-H Club in Macomb that would shape the course of Bea's life.

Finding Purpose Among the Pines at 4-H Memorial Camp

In 1951, Bea attended the second Illinois State 4-H Junior Leadership Conference at 4-H Memorial Camp in Monticello. That week made a lasting impression — from the leadership lessons to the quiet dignity of the evensong ceremony, held at dusk from inside the Allerton House.

Over the years, Bea returned to Memorial Camp many times — as a 4-H member, Extension employee, mentor, conference organizer, and donor.

Among many memorable 4-H Memorial Camp mainstays, one person — Richard Lyon — stands apart for Bea: "He, as State 4-H Leader, called in 1970, offering me the opportunity to interview to become a member of the state 4-H staff."

Bea joined the State 4-H Staff that fall.

Now, she had the opportunity to design Illinois 4-H

Junior Leaders' Conferences for a new generation of 4-H'ers.

Alongside her colleague Walt Griffith, Bea introduced a powerful new idea: inviting underserved guest groups — including senior citizens, children from urban areas, and adults with developmental disabilities — for a shared day of camp with the junior leaders.

One newspaper editorial from the time called it "a two-way change of image." Bea called it leadership learning that makes a difference.

By 1989, Bea was employed as an Extension specialist, Adult Life and Aging, when she accepted an interim, part-time assignment as a regional director that included management tasks with 4-H Memorial Camp.

Bea continues to give back to 4-H Memorial Camp through her annual financial support. This year, she has made a generous \$50,000 gift to celebrate the Camp's 75th anniversary—and to invest in the next 75 years of outdoor learning, leadership development, and lifelong memories for Illinois youth.

Meet Ojas!

McLean County youth, Ojas Shah was named a 2025 Youth in Action Award finalist! This extraordinary 4-H'er is not just making an impact today—he's Beyond Ready to lead the way as a leader of tomorrow.

With resilience, passion, and a commitment to creating real change in his community, Ojas is working to shape a brighter future for all of us.



Competing in over 15 projects each year, Ojas has explored the vast opportunities 4-H offers, from STEM to Healthy Living, Community Service, and Leadership. One significant skill 4-H has given him is public speaking. Stepping onto the McLean County 4-H Fair stage for the first time, he was nervous, but with each speech,

he grew more confident. By high school, he became a state-level speaker and joined his school's Speech Team, eventually becoming the captain and an IHSA Speech State Finalist.

Advocating for mental health through his speeches on the impacts of social media inspired Ojas to pursue healthy living advocacy further. As the Illinois Healthy Living Ambassadors President and Illinois Youth Leadership Team Member, Ojas planned a voga retreat, organized state-wide food drives. and taught meditation techniques. He even conducted a healthy living workshop in India, demonstrating a nutrient-tracking Python app he built. His passion for teaching led him to co-found his high school's CS club, "Bit-by-Bit," which now reaches 300 kids weekly across seven schools. Looking ahead, he aims to expand CS education and advocate for more funding for CS opportunities

in Illinois middle and high

schools.

Cooking Up Skills for the Future

High school students from Gordon Bush Alternative Center in St. Clair County put their culinary talents to the test in a high-energy 4-H Cooking Challenge. Five teams worked together to create delicious, nutritious dishes using all five MyPlate food groups—dairy, grains, fruits, vegetables, and protein. With creativity, teamwork, and a passion for cooking, they proved they're Beyond Ready to take on new challenges in and out of the kitchen.

Judges evaluated each dish on presentation, taste, and nutritional balance, but the real wins were the skills gained. Students sharpened their knife techniques, mastered proper food handling, and learned how to safely cook steak—all while deepening their understanding of nutrition. One excited participant even asked, "Can we do this again?"





Attendees at the Junior Livestock Conference included 100 youth from 50 counties across Illinois, with youth members of the 4-H Livestock Ambassador Team helping to plan and execute this learning experience aimed at 7th, 8th, and 9th graders.

"Seeing young people connect with the livestock industry through hands-on learning is incredibly rewarding," says Dan Jennings, University of Illinois Extension 4-H youth development educator. "This conference gives them the opportunity to explore areas of livestock production they may not have been exposed to before, helping them develop essential skills and broaden their horizons."

Teen leaders from the Livestock Ambassador Team were excited to share their knowledge and skills with the youth that will follow in their footsteps as they shape their own paths in the livestock industry.

"This program is about more than education," says Jennings. "It's about building confidence, fostering teamwork, and creating a network of peers and mentors who share a passion for livestock. These youth are building skills they'll carry into their future careers and communities."

Attendees participated in "Glove-Up Sessions" throughout the conference which allowed them to work hands-on in

a variety of skills, such as giving injections, wound suturing, product quality, marketing, and more.

The event focused on education, but also created great opportunities to build camaraderie and a sense of teamwork around a shared passion for the livestock industry.

Individual accolades included Allison Burrs taking home High Individual in the written phase, stations phase, and overall; Ellis Rogers placing 6th in stations and tying for 5th overall; and Hannah Wenzel finishing 9th in the written phase, 7th in stations, and 9th overall.

The Eastern National 4-H Horse Roundup encourages youth to develop teamwork, self-confidence, and leadership skills, all while aligning with 4-H's mission to inspire youth in Science, Engineering, Technology, Mathematics, Healthy Living, and Citizenship.

Through this partnership, youth gain unique opportunities to:

- Learn directly from collegiate coaches and industry professionals
- Practice grading, identification, and judging on real carcasses and retail cuts
- Explore careers in meat science, food safety, agriculture, and processing
- Tour processing facilities and see behind-the-scenes operations

This high-quality, practical learning environment gives youth skills they can use in future competitions, classrooms, and careers in the agricultural industry.

Firsthand Account

Illinois delegate Julia Gergen (second from the left) of DuPage county shared her experience: At National 4-H Conference, one of our main goals was to provide a youth perspective to government agencies about various topics. 4-H members were divided across various Roundtables of groups that had specific topics to address with a specific agency. These Roundtable groups included topics like healthy eating among youth, promoting 4-H youth mental health, supporting national parks, and many more. We spent several days meeting with these roundtables to develop and practice presentations which we ultimately delivered to our respective agencies.

I was a member of the Promoting Healthy Eating Among Youth roundtable, and I was very proud of the teamwork and creativity that went into our presentation. Civic Engagement

Gifts that pay you back

A charitable gift annuity (CGA) is an easy, popular option that allows you to transfer cash, or appreciated, marketable securities to the University of Illinois Foundation (UIF), and, in exchange, you or up to two people you choose receive a fixed annual payment for life. When the CGA ends, the remaining funds are used to support Illinois 4-H foundation. CGA donors also receive an immediate income tax deduction (if they itemize), subject to applicable limitations, and, in most cases, a portion of their payments are tax-free. CGAs also offer an opportunity to diversify your portfolio and, should you decide to use appreciated securities to fund your annuity, you bypass capital gains tax. CGAs are not available in a small number of states

You can also transfer assets to UIF to establish a charitable remainder trust (CRT) which then makes payments to you or others for life, for a term that does not exceed 20 years, or a combination of the two. A CRT can also diversify your portfolio and, when terminated, its remaining assets will be used to support Illinois 4-H Foundation. Helping 4-H Youth Navigate College Financial Aid as they plan their futures

Understanding financial aid is a key step in preparing for college, and Illinois 4-H is here to help. In partnership with the Illinois Student Assistance Commission, the 4-H College and Career Readiness Specialist hosted a virtual session to guide students and families through the financial aid process. Participants gained insights into FAFSA, the Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid, and available state and federal aid programs. By equipping youth with the knowledge to make informed financial decisions, Illinois 4-H is ensuring they are beyond ready for their next steps in education and career planning.

With support from Compeer Financial, the Ready 4 Work program helped youth across Illinois gain real-world job skills—like writing resumes, preparing for interviews, and managing time. Handson mock interviews gave participants a chance to practice and build confidence.

The program reached over a dozen counties and took place in schools, clubs, and community settings. Thanks to this investment, more youth had access to helpful materials like career planning guides and professional portfolios—tools they'll use as they take the next step toward their future careers.



Four Illinois 4-H members represented Illinois 4-H at the 23rd Annual International Route 66 Film Festival in Springfield Nov. 1-2. Their short films were selected among submissions from 21 countries, highlighting the creativity and dedication of these young filmmakers. Only a limited number of submissions were chosen for live screenings, making this an incredible achievement for the 4-H members.

Colin Weber from Hancock County presented Illinois State Capitol & Illinois State Archives, a documentary showcasing Illinois history. McLean County's Alyssa Thompson shared The Addiction, a powerful film exploring personal challenges and growth. Gracelyn Abell from Whiteside County premiered Meraki: A Week in the Life, a film originally created as a high school English project that transformed into a 4-H entry. Larson Huss of DeKalb County debuted his animated stop-motion film, Mr. Cool and the ATM, developed through a 4-H video-making project.

Larson Huss was honored as the Best Junior Filmmaker at the festival.

Solar Sprint SparksSTEM Learning

University of Illinois Extension 4-H partnered with Jacksonville Middle School to deliver a hands-on STEM program using the Junior Solar Sprint curriculum, supported by Sol Systems, LLC. Over nine sessions, 24 eighthgrade students learned about solar energy, direct current systems, and vehicle engineering before designing, building, and racing their own solar-powered cars. The program emphasized

renewable energy, teamwork, and sustainability, with students dismantling their vehicles after race day for future reuse.

Ride Right Rally Pilots New Safety Learning Experience for Rural Youth

More than 300 sixth-grade students from five western Illinois counties gathered for the inaugural Ride Right Rally, a hands-on safety day focused on off-road vehicle safety. Hosted by Illinois 4-H and Adams County 4-H, this pilot event featured seven rotating stations covering topics like ATV safety, mower and PTO operation, bicycle rules of the road, and roll-over protection systems (ROPS).

Students also witnessed a live emergency response demonstration—including an Air Evac helicopter landing—thanks to Adams County EMS. The experience highlighted how quickly accidents can happen and the importance of safety knowledge and precautions.

The event addressed a critical issue: over 500,000 people in the U.S. sought emergency care for off-road vehicle accidents from 2018 to 2022, with youth under 15 accounting for 12% of fatalities. Organizers hope to raise awareness and reduce risks by empowering youth through education.

The Ride Right Rally was made possible by a collaborative team of partners, including Birkey's Farm Store, Heritage Tractor, Smith Brothers Powersports, local Farm Bureaus, and several Adams County agencies. With its successful debut, the event is being considered for expansion into a statewide youth safety program.

"We're giving students practical safety skills now—before they ever get behind the wheel of an ATV or hop on a mower," said Siera Duesterhaus, Adams County 4-H Program Coordinator.







Building Climate Confidence in 4-H Youth Programming

Illinois 4-H youth are engaging with one of the most complex challenges of our time—climate change—through hands-on STEM learning designed to spark curiosity and environmental stewardship.

Curt Sinclair, a longtime 4-H educator, is helping young people across Illinois connect with the outdoors through activities like planting oak seedlings and building solar-powered cars.
Recently, Sinclair joined other
Extension professionals in
completing Integrating Climate
Into Extension Programming, a
new training developed by Illinois
Extension to boost knowledge
and confidence around climate
science and communication

Sinclair is already applying what he learned, adding climatefocused content to his 4-H fishing curriculum. "The course reminds us that a positive tone is necessary to keep minds open," Sinclair says. "It's totally doable for us to create change—because we've done it before."

The effort reflects how Illinois 4-H, as part of University of Illinois Extension, is preparing youth to face real-world challenges with science, leadership, and hope.



Food Advocacy Grant Key Outcomes:

Expanded Program Reach: With support from Compeer, the Food Advocacy Grant program received 27 grant applications from 23 Illinois counties, the most applications we've ever received. We were then able to, in turn, support the largest amount of food advocacy programming, accepting and funding 14 youth-led food advocacy projects in 2024. This led to a 50% increase in the amount of grant projects we were able to support which is the largest growth we've seen to date year over year.

Skill Development & Workforce Preparation:

4-H youth leaders who participate in this program are gaining foundational skills that are not easy to come by in middle and high school. When the grant program is announced to 4-H staff statewide, they find 4-H'ers in their area that have strong leadership skills and an interest in making their community a better place and those youth are the ones to fill out the Food Advocacy Grant application. This requires them to become familiar with the grant-making process as they are responsible for submitting the project narrative, the budget justification, and the explanation for how funds will be spent. They are also responsible for turning in a report in a timely fashion. All of this emphasizes the importance of communication, analytical thinking and reliability.

Hands-on Learning: Similar to other 4-H programs, the Food Advocacy Grant process emphasizes the importance of creating a 'learn by doing' environment for young people. Working with the support of their local 4-H leaders and 4-H staff who support them, 4-H'ers organize and lead meetings



to discuss their grant proposals. They then draft proposals for review by their 4-H mentor/staff person before submitting them to the State 4-H office for review. They also have the opportunity to learn from their application as they receive written remarks and feedback on how to improve their proposal.

Resource Accessibility: With funding support from Compeer, the Food Advocacy Grant program in 2024 was able to support grant projects from 12 Illinois counties. Of those counties, 10 of them were rural counties with high rates of food insecurity with the remaining 4 being metro and urban areas with high rates of food insecurity. This was a big success for our program and for 4-H as a whole in Illinois because these areas are typically underrepresented in statewide opportunities due to some of the greater barriers to participation that exist.





Growing Engagement and Interest in Agriculture

The Sprout curriculum, developed by students in the Enactus RSO at University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, takes a collaborative approach to igniting interest and learning in diverse agricultural topics. Through this partnership, Illinois 4-H is expanding opportunities for youth to explore Agriculture and Food Systems, with plans to offer the program statewide. This initiative is designed to engage new audiences, spark excitement, and prepare the next generation of leaders to make an impact in the agriculture industry.

Competing against 15 teams from 12 states, the Illinois team showcased creativity, collaboration, and culinary skill. Though they did not advance to the final round, their hard work and dedication made a lasting impression in this exciting national debut.

Emergency Response Ready!

Athens High School youth are now better prepared to respond in emergencies thanks to a hands-on CPR training coordinated by Menard County 4-H. Through this free 4-H In Your Classroom program, students learned to recognize cardiac emergencies, perform chest compressions, and use automated external defibrillators (AEDs). Led by certified instructors, including Erin Nelson, RN, and members of the Illinois National Guard, the training also covered tourniquet techniques and gas mask usage, providing real-world emergency response skills.

Beyond learning CPR, students gained the confidence to act in critical moments. Many shared how the experience changed their perspective, with some even considering careers in the medical field. "This opportunity can save someone's life," said Carley, class of '25. Surveyed students unanimously agreed the program should continue for future classes, reinforcing 4-H's mission to equip youth with the skills they need to lead and serve their communities.

Empowering Youth to Tackle Mental Health with Confidence

According to the World Health Organization, 14% of youth ages 10-19 years old experience a mental health condition. This is why the Your Thoughts Matter curriculum is a great instrument for identifying mental health disorders and erasing the stigma associated with them. Youth Educator Jaylynn Schober and Clark County 4-H EPC Jennifer Bishop teamed up to teach the Your Thoughts Matter curriculum to a group of eighth graders in the Martinsville school district. Students learned about different disorders, the stigmas around them, and how they can be resilient. At the end of the program, students created their own mental health toolkit to help them be prepared and increase their own mindfulness around mental health issues.



Youth Step Into Their Future at Illini Summer Academies



This summer, over 150 Illinois 4-H teens spent a week living and learning on the University of Illinois campus, exploring career pathways through hands-on experiences in 11 different academies. From veterinary medicine to aerospace engineering, youth connected with experts, built new skills, and got a firsthand look at college life.

Youths' favorite experiences at 2025 ISA included: meeting new people, making friends, and connecting with peers; practical, immersive learning experiences in their fields of interests; fun events and downtime; experiencing college life, especially staying in dorms; learning about future careers and meeting professionals.

Ideas for Giving

Donating appreciated securities or mutual fund shares that you have held one year or longer can be a tax-wise way to support Illinois 4-H. You will receive an income tax for the full market value of the gift (if you itemize) and may avoid federal and state tax on the capital gain.

IRA charitable gift: Distributions from your traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and employer-sponsored retirement plans are considered taxable income. A charitable distribution from your IRA directly to the Illinois 4-H Foundation helps you avoid that increase in taxable income and makes a lasting difference in the lives of young people.

A Gift through your estate: A bequest is one of the simplest ways to make a deferred gift and you maintain control of your assets during your lifetime. You can make a bequest by including UIF — for the benefit of the Illinois 4-H — in a provision via your will or living trust. Please share the following language with your estate-planning attorney.

"I leave (\$x,/x%/# of shares/residue) to the University of Illinois Foundation, an Illinois not-for-profit corporation (Tax ID 37-6006007), for the benefit of the Illinois 4-H Foundation supporting the Illinois 4-H Youth Development Program."

Naming UIF beneficiary of your transferable-on-death or payable-on-death brokerage or investment accounts are also wonderful options to support 4-H. 
